14	<p>1 Okay.</p> <p>2 MS. ETTER: The money comes in a</p> <p>3 couple different ways in revenue, the grant and</p> <p>4 then it goes out in the expenses. So it kind of</p> <p>5 -- it doesn't look like, you know, one line plus</p> <p>6 one line (indiscernible) checkbooks.</p> <p>7 MS. BEMIS: So what account is this</p> <p>8 being -- where is the income and the expense</p> <p>9 going? Like, out of what account?</p> <p>10 MS. ETTER: This is the general fund</p> <p>11 and the grants. That what you have -- we didn't</p> <p>12 get that money until October 1st and the sheets</p> <p>13 you have are from September.</p> <p>14 MS. BEMIS: So the money coming in,</p> <p>15 where is that going?</p> <p>16 MS. ETTER: That will go into the</p> <p>17 general fund. There's a grant, special grant line</p> <p>18 (indiscernible).</p> <p>19 MS. BEMIS: Okay. Then Northern</p> <p>20 Lights display for 22, 4-- for \$2,244.</p> <p>21 MS. ETTER: Those are banners.</p> <p>22 MS. BEMIS: That's the cost to make</p> <p>23 the banners?</p> <p>24 MS. ETTER: A certain number of them,</p> <p>25 yes.</p>	16	<p>1 you know what I'm saying? So I'm just trying to</p> <p>2 figure out why these things aren't coded to where</p> <p>3 the money is being brought in from.</p> <p>4 MS. ETTER: Well, this is all a new</p> <p>5 program, this parks.</p> <p>6 MS. BEMIS: Right. And that's why</p> <p>7 I'm trying to get an understanding of it.</p> <p>8 MS. ETTER: I'm just kind of -- in my</p> <p>9 way --</p> <p>10 MS. BEMIS: Yeah, oh, I know. Yeah,</p> <p>11 I get it.</p> <p>12 MS. ETTER: And Alex handles the</p> <p>13 banners, her area handles the banners and the --</p> <p>14 and the processing and the ordering of those so --</p> <p>15 MS. BEMIS: But if she's -- if she's</p> <p>16 gonna put -- if she's gonna charge, say, \$6,000,</p> <p>17 have income of \$6,000 for parks and recs -- or for</p> <p>18 hometown hero banners, then the expenses should be</p> <p>19 reflected as well.</p> <p>20 MS. ETTER: It is. It should be.</p> <p>21 MS. BEMIS: Well, no, because when I</p> <p>22 picked out my parks and rec expenses and income,</p> <p>23 there's -- the expenses aren't there. I had to</p> <p>24 get the audit trail by vendor to find a bunch of</p> <p>25 purchases that aren't coded to parks and rec.</p>
15	<p>1 MS. BEMIS: Okay. And that's just</p> <p>2 coming out of --</p> <p>3 MS. ETTER: That comes out of the</p> <p>4 park (indiscernible) usually.</p> <p>5 MS. BEMIS: Okay.</p> <p>6 MS. ETTER: (Indiscernible) keep it</p> <p>7 all in one place and track it.</p> <p>8 MS. BEMIS: Okay. The reason why I'm</p> <p>9 asking is because I'm trying to get an idea of</p> <p>10 where our money is going and where it's being</p> <p>11 spent and I've admitted I'm very ignorant as far</p> <p>12 as a taxpayer for living here for almost 15 years.</p> <p>13 So when parks and recs puts this is our expense,</p> <p>14 this is our income and the numbers aren't matching</p> <p>15 up and I'm going through and I'm finding thousands</p> <p>16 of dollars that are not being charged to the parks</p> <p>17 and recs department, that's where my question is</p> <p>18 because the majority of our income this year was</p> <p>19 hometown hero banners which I didn't think that</p> <p>20 was a parks and rec income. So when expenses</p> <p>21 aren't being charged to her account, it makes</p> <p>22 obviously the department look better.</p> <p>23 I mean, if I put 20 thou -- hey, I</p> <p>24 brought in \$20,000 but I only spent a thousand</p> <p>25 dollars, well, yeah, but here's another \$12,000</p>	17	<p>1 MS. MADDEN: Because there is no park</p> <p>2 and rec fund.</p> <p>3 MS. ETTER: There is none.</p> <p>4 MS. MADDEN: We don't have a park and</p> <p>5 rec fund because we don't have income that comes</p> <p>6 in under park and rec because we don't have a levy</p> <p>7 that backs it up.</p> <p>8 MS. BEMIS: Well, it's not that</p> <p>9 there's a fund but there's --</p> <p>10 MS. MADDEN: No, that's how it works.</p> <p>11 MS. BEMIS: -- coding for it.</p> <p>12 MS. MADDEN: There's no -- there's no</p> <p>13 fund for it. So it's coming out of the general.</p> <p>14 MS. BEMIS: Right. Well, there --</p> <p>15 it's obviously a sub account of the general fund.</p> <p>16 MS. MADDEN: Is it listed as parks?</p> <p>17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No.</p> <p>18 MS. ETTER: Community environment.</p> <p>19 MS. MADDEN: Okay.</p> <p>20 MS. BEMIS: But --</p> <p>21 MS. ETTER: It is in general.</p> <p>22 MS. MADDEN: Right. It's in the</p> <p>23 general.</p> <p>24 MS. ETTER: (Indiscernible.)</p> <p>25 MS. BEMIS: Right.</p>

BEMIS: But, I mean, I can sit</p> <p>3 here and say I brought in \$20,000 and show zero</p> <p>4 expenses if I don't code that to my department.</p> <p>5 So if I'm gonna code it to sewer and street and,</p> <p>6 you know, capital investments and small</p> <p>7 equipments, this and that. So I'm just trying to</p> <p>8 get an idea of what our true expenses are.</p> <p>9 Because, like I said, when I asked</p> <p>10 for the expenses for that department, there's a</p> <p>11 lot of expenses that are charged to different</p> <p>12 accounts to different departments. So I don't</p> <p>13 know what B0435 is.</p> <p>14 MS. ETTER: That's park donation.</p> <p>15 MS. BEMIS: Parks donation is A04.</p> <p>16 Here I have it written down.</p> <p>17 MS. ETTER: No. That's B04.</p> <p>18 MS. BEMIS: What? B04? Okay. This</p> <p>19 was -- yeah, these weren't listed in the expense</p> <p>20 -- anyways, these weren't listed in the expenses</p> <p>21 that I got. So banner hardware for \$1200. I</p> <p>22 mean, there's just me having to go through</p> <p>23 probably a thousand pages of paperwork to find a</p> <p>24 bunch of expenses that aren't listed in the actual</p> <p>25 expenses. So -- let me go through -- okay.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">20</p> <p>1 I mean, council, were you all aware</p> <p>2 that we spent basically \$130,000 last year for</p> <p>3 parks and rec? I mean, can anybody answer if they</p> <p>4 were aware of that?</p> <p>5 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I think</p> <p>6 that -- I mean, from the standpoint of the budget,</p> <p>7 we do in the general fund, we have the details of</p> <p>8 the budget, each council member gets this binder</p> <p>9 and so depending upon -- I can't speak for any</p> <p>10 other council member but as you heard just at the</p> <p>11 7 o'clock meeting, when you brought concerns about</p> <p>12 things you'd want -- or things you need in the</p> <p>13 community, we have the detail available to, you</p> <p>14 know, make that connection.</p> <p>15 As I said to you at the last meeting,</p> <p>16 we knew that we were making an investment in the</p> <p>17 kids in summer programs. We knew we were trying</p> <p>18 to bring community activities. So, yes, a hundred</p> <p>19 thousand dollars, absolutely, and that's why the</p> <p>20 parks -- park -- the levy. We moved forward to</p> <p>21 putting on the ballot which we'll probably know</p> <p>22 any minute if it passed or not.</p> <p>23 But I think another point back to the</p> <p>24 fund accounting, I mean, it is complicated. I do</p> <p>25 it for a living. It's very complicated when</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">19</p> <p>1 So when I asked for the budget for</p> <p>2 parks and recs, which who knows if it's even going</p> <p>3 to pass. We don't know that yet. I may be even</p> <p>4 wasting my -- well, no, I shouldn't say I'm</p> <p>5 wasting my time, because you said if it doesn't go</p> <p>6 through, it will still be taken out of the general</p> <p>7 fund, correct?</p> <p>8 MR. MARCUS: Uh-hum.</p> <p>9 MS. BEMIS: Okay. So that's my</p> <p>10 concern whether the levy passes or not, just</p> <p>11 the -- the extreme expense that this department is</p> <p>12 costing us. So I totaled up and this was weeks</p> <p>13 and weeks and multiple people getting together,</p> <p>14 that it was \$129,576.53. That's to the penny. So</p> <p>15 when I receive information saying oh, parks and</p> <p>16 recs costs us 60,000 or \$70,000 last year, that's</p> <p>17 not really the truth.</p> <p>18 So as a taxpayer, I start asking</p> <p>19 questions and I get concerned so now that I'm</p> <p>20 going through each and every department, I just</p> <p>21 feel like I don't even know how to describe it. I</p> <p>22 feel like there's a lot of -- there's some more</p> <p>23 balance that we need in the village as far as</p> <p>24 spending goes. I think that our priorities are</p> <p>25 not where they need to be.</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">21</p> <p>1 you're trying to drill down expenses. So the fund</p> <p>2 accounting can get very challenging, it may appear</p> <p>3 that it's a maze. Unfortunately the way</p> <p>4 government works, that fund accounting can get</p> <p>5 very complicated. So as we answer your questions</p> <p>6 through FOI or whatever it may be, most of that</p> <p>7 information, once you understand the fund that</p> <p>8 it's in, like the general fund, you can drill down</p> <p>9 on any expense that we're -- that we're spending</p> <p>10 in the general fund.</p> <p>11 We ought to put some training on it</p> <p>12 at some point in time. I was looking over at</p> <p>13 Brenda, for the fundamentals of fund -- fund</p> <p>14 accounting, I'm being a little bit not serious</p> <p>15 about the training, but I think it would be very</p> <p>16 helpful to the community to understand the</p> <p>17 complexity of fund accounting. It's not that</p> <p>18 we're trying to hide anything, but if you don't</p> <p>19 know fund accounting or you don't know accounting,</p> <p>20 it can get quite -- quite --</p> <p>21 MS. MADDEN: Daunting.</p> <p>22 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: A puzzle. A</p> <p>23 puzzle. But, yeah, I think that would be -- I</p> <p>24 mean, when you count salaries and the FTEs that</p> <p>25 are currently in the parks and rec and how the</p>

<p style="text-align: right;">22</p> <p>1 service department and parks and rec work with 2 each other. A hundred thousand does not surprise 3 me. 4 MS. BEMIS: Well, that's a 130,000 5 not even including -- I mean, there's even -- I 6 even have a copy of an invoice that I can't even 7 find in there. I mean things that just aren't 8 there. But that's not including the service 9 workers' time that was put in there. So -- and 10 that was hundreds of hours I know over the past 11 couple of years putting in benches and trees and 12 making the natureplayground. 13 And, you know, the thing is that we 14 are a small village. We aren't -- we aren't 15 a city -- you know, we aren't -- we're very small 16 and with the tax base that we have, we -- you 17 know, you -- you know why -- you know, I run the 18 NOYA, I've never taken a dime. You know, this 19 isn't for 30 people at a, you know, coming to the 20 garden to volunteer or whatever. This is 5-, 600 21 kids that we deal with. 22 So if it comes down to talking about 23 the kids, then less talk about the kids. This is 24 something that's almost year-round. Aside from -- 25 I mean, I'm still -- you know, we go to state this</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">24</p> <p>1 up -- that are making 10.50 an hour. They're 2 running into burning buildings. They're -- we 3 have EMTs that are sitting here -- this is a life 4 or death situation. I don't understand how we can 5 sit here and pay what we pay for part-time 6 seasonal, however you want to word it, for a parks 7 position. I don't understand it. I mean, that's 8 like paying a doctor 10 bucks an hour and paying 9 the janitor 50. I don't get it. Please help me 10 understand this dysfunction. 11 MR. ARRIOLA: You do understand we 12 went -- just went through a state audit. Took 13 nine months for them to go through and -- and 14 that -- and they found some issues and the issues 15 are being cleared up. But there's no 16 misappropriations of funds. They found everything 17 to be legitimate so -- and we're up to 12 minutes 18 now. We were allowing ten minutes per individual. 19 MS. BEMIS: I didn't know there was a 20 cap. The last meeting said there was no -- 21 MR. ARRIOLA: We -- we went ahead and 22 let you just go off. But there's -- there's 23 procedures we -- we follow and -- 24 MS. BEMIS: Can you at least answer 25 that question?</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">23</p> <p>1 weekend for the boys. You know, we do things 2 for -- for the -- for the kids because we want to 3 do things for the kids. That's why we make it 4 available. We have parents, where kids have been 5 on probation and they come to us and we coach them 6 and we keep their kids busy. That's the biggest 7 thing is that kids don't have anything to do in 8 the town.
